ai was born in 1957 in Quanzhou City, Fujian Province, China. The son of a historian and painter, Cai was trained in stage design at the Shanghai Drama Institute from 1981 to 1985 and his work has, since the outset, been scholarly and often politically charged. Having accomplished himself across a variety of media, Cai initially began working with gunpowder to foster spontaneity and confront the suppression that he felt from the controlled artistic tradition and social climate in China at the time. While living in Japan from 1986 to 1995, Cai explored the properties of gunpowder in his drawings, an inquiry that eventually led to his experimentation with explosives on a massive scale, and the development of his signature explosion events, exemplified in his series, 'Projects for Extraterrestrials'. These explosion projects, both wildly poetic and ambitious at their core, aim to establish an exchange between viewers and the larger universe around them.

Cai guickly achieved international prominence during his tenure in Japan and his work was shown widely around the world. His approach draws on a wide variety of symbols, narratives, traditions and materials such as feng shui, Chinese medicine, dragons, roller coasters, computers, vending machines and gunpowder. He has been selected as a finalist for the 1996 Hugo Boss Prize and been merited with awards such as The 48th Venice Biennial International Golden Lion Prize and 2001 CalArts/Alpert Award in the Arts. Among many of the artist's solo exhibitions and projects are the notable 'Light Cycle: Explosion Project for Central Park', New York, 2003; 'Ye Gong Hao Long: Explosion Project for Tate Modern', Tate Modern, 2003, 'Transient Rainbow, Museum of Modern Art', New York, 2002; 'Cai Guo Qiang, Shanghai Art Museum', 2002; 'APEC Cityscape Fireworks Show', Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation, Shanghai, 2001; 'Cai Guo-giang: An Arbitrary History', Musee d'art Contemporain Lyon, France, 2001; 'Cultural Melting Bath: Projects for the 20th Century', Queens Museum of Art, New York, 1997; 'Flying Dragon in the Heavens', Louisiana Museum of Modern Art, Humblebaek, Denmark, 1997; 'The Earth Has Its Black Hole Too', Hiroshima, Japan, 1994; and 'Project to Extend the Great Wall of China by 10,000 Meters', Jiayuguan City, China, 1993.

Chang Yi is a short story novelist and also one of the key figures in Taiwan's new wave movies. In 1987, Chang established China's first contemporary Liuli arts workshop in Tamshui, Taiwan – Liuligongfang. In 1996, he chose Shanghai as their first important base in mainland China to further develop and promote Liuli arts culture and has led to a rapid growth of the liuli art industry in China, Hong Kong, Taiwan and Singapore. Liuligongfang has been recognized as the founder and pioneer of the modern Chinese Liuli art. The *New York Times* wrote, 'They are China's answer to Harvey Littleton, who is considered the father of the studio glass movement in the United States.'

After having successfully operated 46 showrooms throughout Asia, Chang has created a new dining experience combining Liuli and culinary arts – TMSK where cultural art meets functional lifestyle. Liuligongfang provides a new vision for the future development of modern liuli arts.

ichard A Engelhardt was educated in anthropology, archaeology and the Nhistory of East, South and Southeast Asia at Yale University and Harvard University. For the past 30 years, he has directed archaeology and heritage conservation projects throughout Asia and the Indo-Pacific region. In 1981, he joined the United Nations system and has worked with the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific, as well as a number of UN Specialized Agencies. From 1989-1991, he served as UNESCO1 Chief Technical Advisor on a project to modernize the national museums of the ASEAN² countries. From 1991-1994 he opened and served as Head of the UNESCO Office in Cambodia, where he launched the international safeguarding campaign for Angkor. In recognition of his services in the preservation of the Angkor Monuments, H.M. King Norodom Sihanouk awarded him the prestigious title of Commandeur de l'Ordre Royal du Cambodge. In addition to his Cambodian knighthood, Mr. Engelhardt has been decorated by the governments of China, the Philippines, and Viet Nam for his services to the conservation of cultural heritage. He has also been honoured by the Global Heritage Fund with a Lifetime Achievement Award for contributions to the conservation of the world's heritage.

Currently Mr Engelhardt is UNESCO Regional Advisor for Culture for Asia and the Pacific, based in Bangkok, where he heads UNESCO's culture sector programmes for the Asia-Pacific region. Among his UNESCO responsibilities, Mr Engelhardt serves as Chairman of the International Jury for the annual UNESCO Asia-Pacific Heritage Conservation Awards competition, as is the Co- Convenor of the UNESCO-ICCROM Asian Academy for Heritage Management. In recent years, Mr Engelhardt has held Visiting Lectureships at the University of Hawaii (USA), Waseda University (Japan), Southeast University (China) and the University of Hong Kong. He sits on the Board of International Advisors of Deakin University's (Australia) Centre for Culture Heritage Studies. He is a founding member of mAAN (the Modern Asian Architecture Association); he sits on the Executive Committee of the Indo-Pacific Prehistorian's Association, is a Director of the Thailand Culture Environment Fund, advisor to the Malaysia Heritage Trust, and Honorary Patron of the Jaipur (India) Heritage Trust.

Mr Engelhardt is the author of numerous scholarly articles, books and publications, including: *Two Thousand Years of Engineering Genius on the Angkor Plain* (University of Pennsylvania Press), *Technology in the Service of Archaeology in the Plain of Jars (UNESCO)*, and numerous articles on the ethno-archaeology of maritime communities in the southeast Asian archipelago which are being collated and edited in a book to be published by the University of Utah Press. He collaborated on the recently published textbook on urban conservation in China: *The Horizontal Skyscraper* (Trondheim University Press), and is a contributor to *The World Culture Report*, published by UNESCO.

It is an international event that looks at the impact of creativity on business and society. Before he was a partner and creative director of LIVE, a branding and marketing business that he founded with others in early 2000.

Previously he had been the content editor at the Millennium Dome where he led the development of the exhibition areas, involved working closely with numerous design teams, sponsors and the government to create the UK's biggest paid visitor attraction.

He has worked closely with politicians, organising and creating election campaign visits for both Neil Kinnock and Tony Blair in the 1992 and 1997 elections. Alongside that he originated and drafted numerous policy documents including the first ever national design policy. He also worked closely with film producer, Lord Puttnam, on a wide range of initiatives and projects, and helped John Sorrell to create the blueprint for the new Design Council.

He has also lectured extensively principally at the Royal College of Art and Central St.Martins.

Elsewhere, since 1997 he has been a trustee of 'Artangle', one of the nation's leading contemporary arts organisations. He is also a trustee of the Roundhouse and Chairman of its development committee, tasked with raising £25 million to secure its future.

s Foong is the Director of Megatrends Asia, a global research organization, founded with John Naisbitt of Megatrends fame. An honors graduate of economics from the University of Malaya and a successful business executive, she directs the Asian research programs from bases in Kuala Lumpur and Shanghai. Her research areas include macro economic trends in Asia, the progress of reform and changes in China, cultural industries and sustainable development.

Ms Foong is a much sought-after speaker and advisor by multinational companies and institutions on Asian trends. She serves on the advisory Board of many international organizations including the Economic Development Board of the Port of Rotterdam. Well-traveled and versatile in key Asian languages, she regularly contributes to regional economic and business publications. Francione is the founder and the chief (together with the arch.M.Garavoglia) of GMarchitects an architectural firm, specialized in tropical contemporary design for villas and residences. He has been designing for over the last 10 years' projects in Bali, Seychelles, Malaysia, Thailand, Hawaii and Central America. He has developed strong passion for tribal art and vernacular architectural traditions of Indonesia. His style of design combines tropical and traditional environment with a contemporary vision of space.

Gu was born in Shanghai, China in 1955. He graduated from Shanghai School of Arts in 1976. In 1981 he received his M.F.A. from China Academy of Arts where he studied under the classical landscape painting master Lu Yanshao and where he taught from 1981 to 1987.

After having moved to the USA in 1987, Gu became an associate professor of Studio Art at the University of Minnesota from 1989 to 1990 and received the title of Honorary Minnesotan from the Governor of Minnesota. He has been invited to lecture at various art academies, universities and institutions worldwide.

Since 1981, Gu has participated in numerous international solo and group exhibitions and biennales. Gu's first personal exhibition is regarded as the beginning of conceptual ink art in China and an influential "earthquake" to the traditional ink painting.

Wenda Gu began his fifteen-year ongoing global art project *United Nations*. Under this conceptually, methodologically, geographically, culturally, ethnically and politically as well as artistically most inclusive and complex project, he has completed his United Nations' 24 national monuments and sub-projects, and more than one million and a half people from all over the world have contributed their hair to this art project.

Another ten-year project Forest of Stone Steles - Retranslation & Rewriting Tang Poetry consists of 50 stone steles to be carved with his own contemporary version of 'Tang poems' resulting from a literal translation of Tang poems from Chinese to English, then a translation by sound of the Tang poems from English back to Chinese. From 1999 to 2001, Gu created many other art projects, including Ink Alchemy which utilizes a genetic product made of powdered Chinese hair as an installation as well as for ink painting. Another project, Tea Alchemy uses green tea and traditional rice paper making methods to create green tea paper. Those national treasures of China are given a completely new meaning and life. They are linked to contemporary biological research and to the genetic industry.

Wenda Gu had his first survey exhibition at National Gallery of Australia in 2001 and his first traveling solo exhibition in the US from 2003 to 2004. A book on Wenda Gu's art edited by Mark Bessire: Wenda Gu - From Middle Kingdom to Biological Millennium, published and distributed by MIT Press in 2003. This book has won two awards in 2004: the second place of The American Museum Association and the publications design award of The New England Museum Association.



Ms Zaha HADID Winner of the 2004 Pritzker Award

Zaha Hadid, an Iraqi born British citizen, has been chosen as the 2004 Laureate of the Pritzker Architecture Prize marking the first time a woman has been named for this 26 year old award. Hadid, who is 53, has completed one project in the United States, the Richard and Lois Rosenthal Center for Contemporary Art in Cincinnati, Ohio; and is currently developing another to co-exist with a Frank Lloyd Wright structure, the Price Tower Arts Center in Bartlesville, Oklahoma.

Her other completed projects in Europe include a fire station for the Vitra Furniture Company in Weil am Rhein, Germany; LFone/Landesgartenschau, an exhibition building to mark the 1999 garden festival in that same city; a car park and terminus Hoenheim North, a 'park and ride' and tramway on the outskirts of Strasbourg, France; and a ski jump situated on the Bergisel Mountain overlooking Innsbruck, Austria.

She has numerous other projects in various stages of development including a building for BMW in Leipzig, and a Science Center in Wolfsburg, both in Germany; a National Center of Contemporary Arts in Rome; a Master Plan for Bilbao, Spain; a Guggenheim Museum for Taichung, Taiwan; and a high speed train station outside Naples; and a new public archive, library and sport center in Montpellier, France.

Hadid is the third architect from the United Kingdom to be awarded the Pritzker Prize – an annual award that was established in 1979 by The Hyatt Foundation, is honored to a living architect whose built work demonstrates a combination of those qualities of talent, vision and commitment, which has produced consistent and significant contributions to humanity and the built environment through the art of architecture.

Thomas Krens is Director of the Solomon R. Guggenheim Foundation. He oversees and operates the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum in New York, the Peggy Guggenheim Collection in Venice, Italy, the Guggenheim Museum Bilbao in Spain, the Deutsche Guggenheim Berlin in Germany, and the Guggenheim Hermitage Museum in Las Vegas since July 1988.

After Mr Krens' joined the Guggenheim, his first major accomplishment was the completion of the first phase restoration and expansion of the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum in 1992. The principal components of the \$80 million project were the restoration of the interior of the landmark Frank Lloyd Wright building, the construction of a ten-story tower gallery and office building designed by Gwathmy Siegel Associates, and the addition of a new storage and technical services facility on New York City's West Side. In 2004, the Guggenheim successfully completed a campaign to raise \$25 million for the second phase of the capital project, to restore the exterior facade of the Wright building, upgrade the entire security and climate control systems, and provide public access to the roof terrace of the main building as Wright had originally intended.

Under Mr Krens' leadership over the past 15 years, the Guggenheim Foundation has built an unprecedented international network of cultural facilities and alliances with major museums; there are about 3 million visitors per year attending Guggenheim Museums worldwide.

Born in New York City in December 1946, Mr Krens graduated from Williams College with a B.A. and Honors in Political Economy in 1969. He holds a Masters Degree in Art from the State University of New York, and an MBA from Yale University. From 1971 to 1988, he was an Assistant Professor in the Art Department at Williams College; in 1981 he also became Director of the Williams College Museum of Art.

Mr Krens is currently a member of the Association of Art Museum Directors, the Reunion de Musees the Council on Foreign Relations, New York; and the Societé Kandinsky of Centre Georges Pompidou, Paris. He has received Honorary Doctorates from Williams College, Yale University, and the State University of New York at Albany and in 2000 was awarded the Special Prize for Architectural Patronage at the Venice Architecture Blennale. Mr Krens is also President of the Guggenheim Motorcycle Club.

Born in Hong Kong, Ms Kwai is the founder of the Kwai Fung Culture and Communications Co. Ltd. Before she started her art business, Ms Kwai served international banks and insurance companies for many years. With an enduring passion for art and experience in collecting in earlier years, in 1991, she determined to resign from the financial services and established the first member of the Kwai Fung Group – Kwai Fung Hin Art Gallery, which has focused on the introduction of European oil paintings and sculptures.

In 1996, on the foundation of the Gallery, Ms Kwai founded Kwai Fung Art Consultants. It is engaged in assistance to corporations in the planning and selection of art collection, as well as the application of art designs and installation in upgrading of environment.

In 2000, Ms Kwai established Kwai Po Collection. The masterly French lithography technique inherited through many generations are applied for production and publication of prints created by internationally renounced contemporary Chinese painters, to make many more outstanding modern Chinese paintings accessible to a wider audience.

In more than a decade, the Group have introduced numerous modern European art pieces to Hong Kong and Mainland China, broadened the horizon of the local art scene and promoted cultural interflow between China and foreign countries.

Under Dr Lee's visionary leadership, Chungkang College has received public acknowledgement of its academic excellence and financial support from the Ministry of Education, Ministry of Gender Equality, Korea Culture & Contents Agency, Small and Medium Enterprise Agency, and Kyunggi Province.

Dr Lee studied political science at Ewha Woman's University and the University of Wisconsin-Madison (B.A., M.A.), and business administration (M.S.) and educational administration (Ph.D) at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Currently, she serves as a member of the board of directors of the Korea Cultural Industry Forum, World Cyber Games Organizing Committee, and Human Resources Development at YWCA. Recently, Dr Lee was appointed as a member of the board of directors at the Korea Culture & Contents Agency.



Dr MA Ka FaiAssistant Director of the Chinese

a Ka-fai was born in Hong Kong in 1963. After completing his secondary education, he furthered his studies in Taiwan, and received his bachelor's degree from the Department of Psychology of National Taiwan University, majoring in social psychology. He started writing in his university years, and had published *Studies on Li Ao* (Taiwan Yuan Liu), *Urban New Humans* (Taiwan Yuan Liu), *Psychological Tidbits* (Taiwan Laureate), *Consumer Psychology* (Taiwan Yuan Liu), *Daughterly Love* (Hong Kong Sub-culture), *Dazzled Eyes and Indulgent Beauty* (Oxford University) and other books.

After graduation, Ma joined an advertising agency and worked as a sales planner. Later he joined the media profession, working with *Earth Geographic Magazine* as a reporter. He spent two years reporting in Laos, Cambodia and Burma. In 1988, he furthered his studies in the US, and earned his Master of Social Sciences degree from the University of Chicago. His thesis was entitled 'Heroic type films and their relationship with Hong Kong's social changes', and won The Earl S. and Esther Johnson Prize. In late 1996, he received his PhD in Sociology from the University of Wisconsin–Madison, majoring in political sociology and cultural studies. During that period, he acted as teaching assistant and lecturer, and won a number of teaching prizes.

He returned to Hong Kong in 1997 and joined *Ming Pao Daily* as Deputy Chief Editor, responsible for the planning of the supplements. At the end of March that year, he set up the 'Century' supplement, which soon became an important forum for Hong Kong's intelligentsia. In mid 1998, he joined the City University of Hong Kong as Assistant Director of the Chinese Civilisation Centre, mainly responsible for the planning and development of web-based teaching. In addition, he actively took part in the planning of TV, radio and print media, with a special passion for the promotion of reading. He is also a columnist for publications in China, Taiwan and Hong Kong, including *Ming Pao Daily, Hong Kong Economic Journal, Shenzhen Commercial Daily, China Times* and *The Journalist*. Between 1998 and 2001, he was a guest host for Phoenex Satellite TV, and took part in planning the programme 'Trip of Three' which won the 'Ten Best Programmes' award in China.

He is currently working on both conceptual and applied frameworks for 'cultural indicators' in the UK, Europe and Hong Kong.

Jack Morton Worldwide, founded in 1939, is the world's leading producer of public events. Successful public event deliveries include the Hong Kong Handover Ceremony and the Opening and Closing Ceremonies of the Manchester Commonwealth Games. Earlier this year the Company produced the Opening and Closing Ceremonies for the Summer Games of the 28th Olympiad in Athens. Prior to joining Jack Morton Worldwide in 1996, Antony built up an impressive list of credentials that spanned the film, television, musical and corporate theatre production industries. Working with Tony Award-Winning production company Gordon Frost, Antony, at his age of 25, won the much-coveted contract to produce the Microsoft Windows' 95 launch in Australia.

Following on from Antony's successful move into corporate events full time with Jack Morton, his move to Hong Kong has been similarly marked by significant achievements shown in pan Asian roadshows for companies such as Singapore Airlines, Intel, Prudential Asia, WorldCom and Allergan. In October 2000, he worked with the Department of Foreign Affairs in Shanghai in formulating the design and structure of the 6th Major Cities Summit. In 2001 in Hong Kong, he produced all State Receptions and Official Dinners for the Fortune Global Forum, which was attended by the former President of the US, Bill Clinton, President Jiang Zemin of PRC, and Prime Minister Thaksin of Thailand.

Antony has also been engaged in many other international official events, such as overseeing the headline acts in both the Opening and Closing Ceremonies of the XVII Commonwealth Games in Manchester (2002); working with HKSAR and ITU, the information technologies arm of the United Nations, to produce the Opening Ceremony of ITU Telecom Asia (2000 & 2002); and executing both the Plenary sessions and the headline social event for the CLSA Investors' Forum (2002, 2003, & 2004) attended by Bill Clinton with live satellite link-ups with U2's Bono in Ghana, and Rupert Murdoch in New York.

2004 saw Antony's secondment to Athens as a Lead Producer for the Opening and Closing Ceremonies for the Summer Games of the 28th Olympiad. Jack Morton led the ceremony production with a team of over 850 in Athens as well as international expertise drawn from its London, Los Angeles, Sydney and Hong Kong offices.



Mr TAN Swie Hian
Winner of World Economic Forum
Crystal Award 2003

Born 1943 in Indonesia and graduated in 1968 from Nanyang University, Singapore, Tan Swie Hian is the most celebrated multi disciplinary artist of Singapore.

Tan Swie Hian published his first collection of modern poetry The Giant in 1968, which is the culmination of the Chinese modernist literary movement in the history of Chinese literature in Singapore and Malaysia. To date, he has had 37 publications of poetry, essays, stories, criticisms and translated works to his credit. Being multilingual, he is the first to have translated works by such literary giants as H. Michaux, J. Prevert, S. Beckett, V. Nijinsky and M. Sorescu into Chinese. In 1978, he was conferred Chavalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres by France. In 1998, he won the Marin Sorescu International Poetry Prize from Romania. Tan held his first art exhibition in 1973 and ever since he has exhibited his paintings in oil, Chinese ink and acrylic, sculptures, calligraphy, cartogravures, prints and seal engravings in numerous solo and group shows in Singapore and worldwide. In 1987, he was conferred the Singapore Cultural Medallion. He went on to win a Gold Medal in Salon des Artistes Français, Paris in 1995 and the Seoul International Calligraphy Gold Medal in an international calligraphy exhibition to mark the Korea/Japan World Cup 2002. Most recently, he was conferred the prestigious Crystal Award 2003 by the World Economic Forum for outstanding artistic achievements and contribution to cross-cultural understanding.

Tan has worked with choreographers, dancers and dramatists for numerous performances. He is also a stage and costume designer. Since 1987, Tan has been the first and only southeast Asian artist to be elected as a correspondent-member to the august and the most ancient artistic institution in the world – The Academy of Fine Arts of the Institute of France.

In 1993, the first private museum in Singapore – The Tan Swie Hian Museum – was built by his collector, Tan Tien Chi. Since 2001, work has started to build the world's first earth art museum – The All-Wisdom Gardens: Tan Swie Hian Earth Art Museum, which sprawls over a mountain range of two square kilometers in Qingdao, China.

In 1993, he published the five-volume Selected Works by Tan Swie Hian in China. In 1996, the calligraphy of Tan's preface to the Museum of World Famous Chinese Artists' Works was inscribed in a stele and erected at the entrance of the museum along Yangtze River, China. In 2000, his essay and calligraphy to celebrate the

birthday of the Yellow Emperor was inscribed on a boulder and erected in the Imperial Mausoleum, Shanxi, which is the No.1 Ancient Tomb in China.

In 1998, he was selected by the United Nations, together with 97 other established artists from all over the world, such as Hockney, Christo, Lichtenstein, Boey, Matta and Tapies, to illustrate a new edition of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, to mark the 50th anniversary of its adoption by the world body.

Back home, Tan has just completed a gigantic enamel mural and an immense granite floor calligraphy for the Chinatown subway station which lies at the historical heart of Singapore.



Mr David TANG

Founder of 'Shanghai Tang'

David Tang, 50, holds an O.B.E. from Britain and a Chevalier de L'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres from France. He was educated in Hong Kong, Cambridge, London and Peking. He studied Philosophy and Law and taught the Ph.D. students at Peking University between 1983-1984. Tang is also the founder of the China Clubs (Hong Kong, Peking and Singapore), Shanghai Tang stores and Pacific Cigar Company and Cipriani (Hong Kong and London). He holds a number of international directorships and advisorships, including Tommy Hilfiger in U.S.A., and Savoy Group of Hotels in London.

Tang is involved with numerous charities, in particular as founder of The Hong Kong Cancer Fund, President of the Hong Kong Down Syndrome Association and Mental Handicap Network China, as well as a trustee of the Royal Academy of Arts in London, and adviser to the London Symphony Orchestra, as well as the President of the London Bach Society.
